Heritage Rescue Report Update on old tannery outbilding

We reported in the spring that the owner of a house on Brown St. offered to give us an old, log tannery building located on the site, if we would take it down. He planned to replace the building with a modern shed and preferred to see it taken down and reconstructed elsewhere rather than demolished. We eagerly examined the building and discussed options for relocating it. After a great deal of consideration SHA has decided not to pursue the dismantling, storage and reconstruction elsewhere of the building. Its condition is poor with a considerable percentage of the logs damaged and requiring replacement. The roof is not original. The building is not in its original context, having been moved sometime after 1950 from the north side of Queen St. Also, historic preservationist James Massey examined the building and noted that its rude construction, without windows, indicates its lack of importance at the time of construction after the Civil War and that it was built only as a rough shed. When we reported our decision to the property owner, he stated that he and his tenant have decided to continue using the building instead of replacing it. So, you'll still see this reminder of a lost industry tucked away along Town Run.

Welcome New Board Member

We are pleased to announce our newest board member Marie Spence. Marie is a life long resident of Shenandoah County and a graduate of Strasburg High School, Shenandoah University and James Madison University. She also attended UVA. Marie taught school one year in Shenandoah County and then spent 34 years as an educator in Frederick County schools, teaching social studies, U.S. History and government. A local historian, Marie has authored two books on the history of the Strasburg Presbyterian Church. She researched the church history back 60 years to create "Reflections Along the Path" for the church 180th anniversary in 2002 and later wrote a second volume. At James Wood High School, Marie's exceptional photojournalism produced 10 award winning yearbooks. As well as her strong interest in history and English, she has also studied her Celtic ancestry. Her mother's ancestors were Irish and her father's Scottish ancestors came to Jamestown in 1607: Ancestor William Spence was a "first farmer" in the settlement. Marie has been a member of the Strasburg Museum Board for three years. She enjoys doing presentations for local civic groups on such topics as First Ladies, history, photography, and genealogy. The joy of her life is her Irish Terrier "Dirk." Marie

enjoys traveling and has visited ten other countries and recently hiked the Southwestern U.S. canyons in Arizona, Utah and the Grand Canyon.

We are honored to have Marie on the SHA board and are very happy she is sharing her many skills and abilities with us. She will be a valuable asset.

Shannonhouse Building

One large white frame multi-level structure, circa 1890's, which stands at 219 West King near the corner of Fort Street, has served numerous purposes for our community throughout its history and currently as Cristina's Café. For most of it existence, this building was directly adjacent to a better remembered edifice known as the Kaplan Building which originally was constructed as the People's Bank (local roots of the First Bank). When this bank relocated, Reuben Kaplan moved his business from the Strasburg Junction and operated a grocery and soft goods store at that corner location on what then was widely known as part of "the business section" of Strasburg.

Mr. & Mrs. Kaplan and their three sons conducted business on the first floor and lived above the store for many decades. Later years saw several other businesses come and go until April 23, 1998 when a massive fire destroyed that structure. Great concern was raised that destructive day about the safety of neighboring buildings including the Strasburg Community Library, but only the Kaplan Building burned.

According to numerous long term Strasburg area citizens, the building has had many purposes and physical remodels. Once a business school in its early years, it has also served as a restaurant and bar run at different times by Lute Ludwig and

Jazzbo Connor (father of Graham Connor), as Bob Riddleberger's General Merchandise and Clothing Store, a sandwich shop, Bush's Barber Shop (1940's thru 1960's), a laundry mat, Benson Pet Supply, a washing machine and heavy appliance enterprise, a furniture store, a coffee shop, a card shop and, in more recent years, several restaurants. The building's current occupant is Cristina's Cafe. Cristina's Cafe provided refreshments for this year's Holiday Heritage Homes Tour. In its early years, the building was owned and leased to various business people byowner F. E. (Floyd) Grove. Later Pete (Cecil) Grove owned the structure and in more recent years Ann Grove Keller oversaw the property. It is now owned by Byron Brill and leased by Chrissy Willis Maddox.

Throughout its existence, this main street structure maintained relevant usefulness for the citizens of our community and visitors.

Update on Old Cemetery

The tombstone preservation work reported in our last newsletter has been completed at the old Queen St. Cemetery. Under the direction of member Gloria Stickley, Rinker & Frye Memorials in Mt. Jackson cleaned the 18th Century tombstone of Obadiah Funk and placed a protective plexiglass cover over it. Adjacent to the tombstone they placed a new granite marker with the same inscription as the original stone, which has become very difficult to read. Our thanks go to Gloria for spearheading this project. Make a visit to the cemetery and see the preservation work. It is part of the Strasburg Walking Tour on Queen Street.

The Heritage Association Remembers C. Douglas Cooley Kathy Kehoe

C. Douglas Cooley, who died at the age of 87, was a founding member of the Strasburg Heritage Association and contributed many wonderful articles to the newsletter. Our community lost this local historian and author in October. Doug is especially remembered by the three volumes he wrote about his life and about the town of Strasburg: "Strasburg Community Memories—A Pictorial Display in the Strasburg Museum", "Strasburg Community Memories—The Second Volume", and "My Strasburg—The Beginning and Ending of my Life There," an autobiography. Doug also wrote "A Strasburg Potter's Daughter."

Doug was a great story teller and had a wonderful sense of humor. He writes in one of his books that after he retired, he and his wife Pauline moved back to Strasburg and couldn't decide which church to attend. Since they had "relatives and good friends in each one of the Strasburg churches" they decided that they would attend each one once a month. He writes of attending a community prayer breakfast and sitting at a table with all the ministers in town. Doug teased the ministers about which one would conduct his funeral. "I suggested that they match for it or play odd man out." he writes. As Doug tells it, the ministers decided each one would say something, "if there was anything worthwhile to say." Doug jokes that "I am sure it will be a brief service." As it turned out, Doug's memorial service was held at the Strasburg Methodist Church with Methodist ministers, Rev. Ed Winkler and Rev. Bill Taylor, Pastor-Emeritus and the Rev. Dr. Geneal Wilson, Pastor of the Christian Church.

In "My Strasburg", written in 2002, Doug reflects on his eventual final journey from this life: He writes, "To bring down the curtain on at least some of the highlights of my life, I must say it has been a good one filled with a variety of experiences. I have a place in our family plot in Riverview that is ready for my ashes. That is the easy part. The hard part is not knowing whether my report card is acceptable enough to get me where I want to go on my next trip. The travels I have made to places all around the world were enjoyable for the most part, although there was some fear and apprehension involved on some of them and there will probably be some on this one. However, I still look forward to going to a place where I have never been. Hopefully, it will be a beautiful one. I shall see......

I am sure it was a beautiful one for C. Douglas Cooley, our neighbor and friend.
